The group, founded in 1979, includes six women whose passion for international music, dance, and women's issues fill concert halls around the world. They have performed at festivals, educational institutions and spiritual centers, including International Folklore Festivals in Bulgaria, the Philadelphia Folk Festival, the American Cultural Center in Delhi, and the Coup de Coeur Francophone in Montreal. They have been part of the Christmas Revels in Cambridge.

They sing a cappella and also accompany themselves on a wide range of instruments including guitar, oud, hammered dulcimer, clarinet, and panpipes. Their music spans centuries from ancient traditions to contemporary creations.

The concert is open to the public and some of the proceeds will benefit the Meeting House. Call the office for ticket information. General admission is \$12 in advance and \$15 at the door. Kids 12 and under, and seniors 65+ are \$10 in advance and \$12 at the door.

I was amazed at how many folks piled into the sanctuary in early March to hear the second sermon on evil. I found myself thinking, "What do Cape Cod people know of evil?" The worst that happens is a day when it's too windy to go sailing. Of course that's not true. We have our share of tragedies, of sadness, of disease and deaths, even a certain amount of crime. But we kind of put this face to the world as if to say "the bad things don't happen here so much."

I guess this smiley face is harmless enough, but my worry is that it keeps us from reaching out to the people who really need a helping hand. There is this American syndrome, particularly strong in New England, but really nationwide, that says "I'm OK; don't worry about me; I can make it fine on my own." We all find it difficult to ask for help. So I'm really gratified that our Pastoral Care team is so good about organizing rides and home-cooked meals for people who need it on a temporary basis.

Melissa served overnight at the storm shelter at Dennis-Yarmouth High School during the recent blizzard, and she said what impressed her was how many elderly people there are living alone in our towns with no support system in place. It occurs to me that probably the most important function this church fulfills, maybe its mission in life, is to provide a way for us to be there for each other. We can't take away the pain of the accident or the operation, we can't bring the dead back to life, we can't provide 24/7 care for the disabled loved one, but we can do something to show we care and to be a listening ear for those among us in distress. I would like to challenge all of us to think of ways we can take our ministry to each other out beyond our walls to some of those people who came into the shelter last month.
